The Long Wait

Dear Friends,

In 2023 we might be forgiven for thinking that Christmas starts once the big brand companies release their adverts to our screens. From mid-November (or even earlier) social media is buzzing with rumours of which will be the stand out advert of the year and in many ways the battle of the ads has taken over from what used to be the battle for Christmas number 1.

While televisions and tv advertising has been part of our lives for many decades, the idea of the Christmas ad is a relatively new phenomenon. For those of you who can remember back to the 1980's, Oxo Gravy produced what was at the time a rarity in a targeted Christmas TV ad. In Ireland in the late 80's ESB got in on the market. For many years following Marks and Spencer's were known for targeting the Christmas market. However, it was not until 2011 that the battle of the ads truly began. Some four years after their first Christmas ad, John Lewis released their biggest production to date with "The Long Wait". The Long Wait was the first ad to have a major production team behind it with an emotive storyline.

The Long Wait was set to the lyrics of the Smiths Song "Please, Please, Please Let Me Get What I want" and followed the story of young boy impatiently




waiting for Christmas Day to arrive. As the boy gulps down his dinner on Christmas Eve before hurriedly running up to bed, the audience expects him to get the present he's been waiting for on Christmas morning. However, the twist to the advert is that when the boy awakes on Christmas morning he runs past the presents left around his bed and goes straight to his bedroom wardrobe where he takes out a badly wrapped gift before running to his parents room to hand them the present he's been so excited to give to them. The advert ends with the words "For gifts you can't wait to give".

There is of course no doubt that these advertisements are designed to not only pull on the heart strings but to also get us reaching into our pockets to spend money on the products in shops that are being advertised. There is though something about this particular advert that sums up for me the season.

Advent begins on Sunday 3rd December and almost sits

uncomfortably in our modern commercial world amongst the hustle and bustle of the Christmas preparations. Advent is a time of preparation, a time of waiting and reflection. That first Christmas morning in the small town of Bethlehem was the cumulation of the long wait for the coming of the Messiah. The birth of Jesus had been foretold hundreds of years before by prophets like Isaiah and Micah and yet the incarnation of God's son almost went completely unnoticed bar a few shepherds and latterly some wise men following the stars.

Jesus coming into our world was the gift that God longed to give to all of humanity, a gift that ended in the cruelty of a wooden cross beginning another long wait for when Christ would come again. We live today in that time of the long wait for the time when the brokenness and darkness of this world will be no more. As we struggle to understand wars around the world, violence on our streets, a rise in hatred towards one another it would be easy for us to lose hope, or lose faith and to think that the time of peace and harmony on earth will never come, but just like the little boy in that advert we have to patiently wait for that perfect gift to come.

If we were to see Advent as simply a time of waiting for something better we would have missed the point. Advent calls us to live in the day, to live with hope and to live with anticipation not just about what God will do in the future but also what God can do in our present.

Let's go back to the end of the advert and that line "For gifts you can't wait to give". We might not individually have the capability to change our world, but this Christmas time we certainly can impact upon those around us, both known and unknown. Imagine if the idea of longing to give more than we receive wasn't just an advertisers gimmick to make us send more money but instead how we decided to approach not only Christmas but life itself.

Of course there are opportunities to put our hands in our pockets and give to others, we'd love you to support our Christmas appeal to supply hats, scarves and gloves for the homeless. During December there'll be an opportunity to donate to our sharing and caring fund and in the New Year our monthly donations for the foodbank will be up and running. These are all wonderful ways of giving and showing love to others. But there are other ways too. Giving the gift of ourselves, our time, our talents is such a wonderful way to bring the hope of Christ to those around us. It may be a simple smile, a helping hand. It could be volunteering in church or for a charity. You could get involved with our mission outreach both at home and overseas.

The gift of ourselves, the gift of being there for someone in need, the gift of going out of our way to lend a hand, the gift of being present, the gift of praying for someone, the gift of encouragement ... aren't these the gifts that will truly bring peace, love and hope this Christmas?

Maybe in the busyness of the season whether we are filled with joy and excitement, or even fear and dread about what Christmas will mean to us this year, we might just make something different of the long wait, we might just consider the gifts we can't wait to give.

"For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace."

May I take this opportunity to wish you all God's richest blessing for Christmas and the New Year. I look forward to seeing many of you over the Christmas period. If you haven't been in church for a while please come and say hello, I trust you will find a warm welcome. If you find yourself struggling or overawed by the time of year, please don't hesitate to get in touch.

Aside from all the preparation and excitement for our Advent and Christmas events, we of course have been continuing with our regular ministry. I have been continuing to visit to parishioners houses and have even brought Rufus with me as my ministry helper! Rufus also continued his own ministry as he joined the

The parish baby group, Tiny Tots, has more than tripled in size since September, with more than thirty babies and toddlers on our register for regular attenders. Our Tiny Tots volunteers have done a fantastic job in planning lots of fun activities to keep us busy each week. We also had a small group of

volunteers attend a Diocesan event to encourage parishes that run parent and toddler groups.

Following the success of Tiny Tots, I would



like to start a second children's group in the new year. I will be starting the new group, "Play and Pray" once I have a few volunteers who can support this new ministry. The concept of the group is to teach children from seven years of age and under more about the Christian faith through fun and interactive games. Finally, as we continue in Advent we think about preparation and looking forward. Some of you will know by now, I am someone who loves planning and setting goals. My goals for the New Year is to further develop our outreach. Boys' Brigade


The focus of BB in November and December has been "Get Involved" with both groups working on community projects.
