## RECTOR WRITES

Dear Friends,

In both Luke and Matthew's Gospel Jesus says "where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." It's a Bible verse I've always known by heart as when I was a child I read it every Sunday on our church envelopes. Also as a child I loved the movie Treasure Island based on the book by Robert Louis Stevenson and I often played games which involved hunting for lost "treasure".

Ideas of treasure and treasure chests always seemed so exciting and mysterious.

I find it interesting that Jesus spoke those words as part of the Sermon on the Mount when he laid out a new radical way of following God and interpreting God's law. In the midst of telling us that the very outcasts of society were blessed by God, Jesus also says "do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth" as earthly treasures would quickly disappear. For those of you who can recall finding chocolate coins in your childhood treasure hunts you'll know how quickly treasure can disappear. Now you'll all know by now that chocolate wouldn't be my idea of treasure, but that's the thing about treasure it can't be easily defined.

Of course treasure can immediately make us think of finances and riches, but there are many other things we can treasure, possessions, relationships, our health and even our pets and more. Sadly, we all know too well, either from our own experience or the experience of those we know that the one thing all of these have in common is that they don't last forever.



Jesus doesn't want us to cling too tightly to earthly treasures as they don't define us and they are merely temporary. Jesus wants us to live lives that are appreciative of what we have and to be people who are generous and who look out for the needs of others.

So what does it mean for our treasure and our heart to be as one? For me, it is when we are thankful to God for all the good gifts we have received and we acknowledge that those gifts are there to be used for God's glory



and the good of others. As part of our Lenten Mediation I suggested the question "do we give with a grateful heart?" As I journeyed through Lent I pondered a lot on this question.

When Jesus challenges us to a radical way of living that is generous in spirit, it is meant to be exactly that — challenging. When I bring up the topic of generous giving it is also challenging and involves looking in the mirror. Yet, as challenging as it may be, I would not be fulfilling my role as your Rector if I simply ignored it. We need to be challenged on our giving both of our gifts and talents and our finances. We must examine ourselves and ask ourselves the question where is our heart?

In our churches we are striving to build a community where we grow in faith together, where people feel loved and welcome and where we have a positive impact upon our community and beyond. In order to fulfil this vision we all need to give of our time, gifts and

talents. We are so grateful for all those who volunteer in so many ways in our churches. There is a danger in every church community that we over rely on the same people and assume they will do everything, we can then be in danger of burning people out. More people are needed for practical jobs as well as using their gifts for our mission and

outreach. A church truly grows when we all give generously of ourselves, we all have a part to play, what is yours?

Then there is the even more challenging topic to broach, our financial giving. We are currently in the midst of a cost of living crisis with many people finding it hard to cope with rising costs in the shops and in our homes. Unfortunately those costs are also affecting us as a

church as we seek to both maintain our buildings and carry out mission. I once again encourage you all to attend our Easter General Vestries when, amongst other information, our treasurers present our annual accounts. Those accounts give us a stark reminder of how much it costs to run a church.

As your Rector I purposely do not know, or wish to know, how much any individual or family gives. Financial giving is not about how much you give but rather goes back to our heart for giving. Remember the wonderful parable Jesus told about the widow who gave very little but was deemed to be full of generosity as she gave all that she could? When we look at our income from church giving as a whole we will see that giving rarely increases from year to year. The reality is if we expect a church that is well maintained, that is warm and has activities for all ages we must realise, this can no longer happen when our weekly donation is less than what we'd pay for a cup of coffee.

There are couple of easy steps you can take to help us with our church finances:

Set up a monthly Standing Order as this enables the Select Vestry to budget year to year. It also ends that hunt for cash in the house on a Sunday morning.

- Complete a Charity tax Return form if you are a tax giver as this enables us to get additional income for any yearly giving of more than €250.
- Support our forthcoming fundraising events and invite others along.
- Perhaps most importantly PRAY and examine if you are giving with a grateful heart.

If you would like more information on the accounts or on how to implement any of the above, please speak to Gordon Hill in Clonsilla or Alex Kitching in Castleknock and Mulhuddart, our two treasurers.

Talking about giving is never easy, it is by definition meant to challenge us. Firstly, we should be encouraged by how many in our churches give so generously of both of their time, gifts and finances to enhance the life of our church community and to further God's Kingdom. As your Rector I cannot thank you enough for all you do. By continuing to seek God's guidance, by continuing in prayer and by continuing to encourage and support one another, I have no doubt we will discover what our treasure truly is and our generosity will flourish.

## **Habitat for Humanity Mission Trip 2024**


Over the last few weeks the Cambodia team have begun planning for the trip and trying to find ways to involve as many people as possible in the project from home. There will be a team of fourteen flying out on 27th September for what promises to be a life changing experience.

The team are launching our "'Buy A Brick' Fundraiser" for the building of homes in Cambodia. Each brick purchased will go towards the cost of building homes for vulnerable families. Bricks will be €20 each and you can support by buying as many as you might like. The bricks, with names on, will be attached to the wall in the entrance hall in Castleknock Parish Centre with the aim of filling the whole wall. The names will also be on a gift that will be given to the families for their homes to show that our whole community is supporting them.

You can donate to the build at any time in cash or directly through our online fundraising page at https://habitatireland.enthuse.com/cf/cmc-cambodia2024. If you donate via our online page and your donation is for our Buy A Brick campaign please note it in the comment section or let one of the team know.

All fundraising will be used to cover the cost of the build (not travel, etc.). Each team member contributes €850 towards the cost of the house building, we have already had one very generous offer to cover the cost of one of the build contributions from someone who is unable to travel but wants to support the team. All contributions along with prayer and encouragement will be greatly appreciated. Remember "you don't have to lift a hammer to help."

It was very special to journey together and with Jesus through Holy Week with our theme this year of "Wait and Listen." Each evening our services gave us the opportunity for worship and reflection.

We began on Monday evening in St Mary's with the theme of 'Perfume' and Rev Natasha encouraging us to treasure the gift of life and to remember the sacrifice of Mary in giving such an expensive gift to prepare Jesus for the coming cross.

On Tuesday evening we moved to St Brigid's where our theme was "Walking in the Light." Rev Colin encouraged us to follow the example of Jesus to chase the daylight even in the darkest of times as the light of Christ overcame the despair of the cross.

We returned to St Mary's on Wednesday evening when we faced the actions of Judas with the theme of 'Betrayal.' Stella gave us on a reflection for what it meant for Judas or any of us to betray Jesus, and importantly the forgiveness that is open to us all.

On Thursday evening we experienced something a little different with a Seder Meal in Castleknock Parish Centre. Rev Natasha, with the help of her "12 disciples", led us through the origins of the Seder Meal along with the washing of feet as we were transported back in time to Jesus' Last Supper with his disciples. We enjoyed a delicious lamb stew (and equally delicious veggie alternatives) as we shared around the tables.

We then moved to St Brigid's for the stripping of the church before leaving in darkness as we journeyed towards Good Friday.

On Good Friday, our annual Ecumenical Walk with the Cross saw us walk together as a community with the cross between the churches of Castleknock with a short time of reflection in each church.

Starting in Laurel Lodge, Rev Colin led our worship before we walked with the cross to Beech Park where Rev Natasha led us. The finally part of the journey led us to St Brigid's where Father Damian led our worship before we laid stones representing our burden at the cross. We then shared fellowship over refreshments.

On Good Friday evening we ended our Holy Week Services with a deeply moving time at the cross in St Mary's, Clonsilla.
