# **RECTOR WRITES**

### IS JESUS THE BRUSSELS SPROUTS OF CHRISTMAS?

Dear Friends,

That's most likely not a question you hear every day or let's be honest, it's probably a question that has never been asked. However, as I pondered on my Christmas magazine notes I couldn't get this image out of my head.

Which camp do you sit in? For me you can't have a Christmas Dinner without a decent helping of Brussels sprouts, I love them.

Even as I type those words I can imagine many of you turning your nose up at the very thought of having one of those small green vegetables on your plate. A bit like the debate over pineapple on your pizza, the question of sprouts or no sprouts will likely divide opinion for generations to come. Interestingly, a BBC survey taken last Christmas discovered that the question of sprouts quite literally spilt a nation.

The thing is if you're a sprout fan you really couldn't imagine Christmas without them. If you're not a fan then you couldn't imagine Christmas with them.

So why am I comparing Brussels sprouts to Jesus? Well it seems to me that for many people in 2025, the thought of having Jesus as part of Christmas seems as off putting as having a Brussels sprouts. In fact the research into Jesus at Christmas is a lot more worrying than the 50/50 sprout opinion. Surveys going back over the last 15 years show an alarming fall in Christmas being seen as a Christian festival at all. A survey by the Christian Institute in London in 2014 of 2000 children showed that a third did not know that Jesus had anything to do with Christmas at all.

While these figures may seem alarming to us in the church, they really shouldn't come as a surprise with Christmas lights even here in Dublin now being described as "winter" lights and an ever increasing rise in commercialism where only a shiny nativity may be seen to have any value to trade.

For many people in 2025 there is little or no thought to Jesus at Christmas and many, like the poor old sprout,

would be happy to leave Jesus off the menu.

Where do we stand? I would hope

that for all of us the thought of Christmas without Jesus is unthinkable. However, I wonder if Jesus has just become another side dish. Like those who continue to serve up the dish of sprouts that are often pushed to the

side of the plate, is Jesus just there out of tradition or is the birth of our Saviour the centre point of our celebrations?

When the angels miraculously appeared to a group of random shepherds over 2000 years ago they declared "to you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord." That baby who was

wrapped in swaddling cloths and lying in a manger was the one that the prophets had foretold, the one who would bring great light into the darkness of the world. That Christmas story of love and hope is as relevant today as it was to those shepherds. Jesus came into our world so that we could witness the fullness of God's glory and he died on a cross so that we might have life in its fullness.


We can chose this Christmas to leave Jesus off the menu or we can keep his presence there out of tradition. Alternatively we can allow his light to shine in and through us, we can share his love with others and we can recognise him as Lord and Saviour not just for Christmas but for every part of our lives — Christmas without Jesus (or Brussels sprouts) makes no sense!

One of the ways to ensure Jesus stays at the centre of our Christmas is to come and worship together so I look forward to seeing many of you over the coming weeks.

On behalf of myself and Janice, I wish you a peaceful Christmas and New Year filled with the hope and love of Jesus, the light of the world.






Craft Corner is growing slowly and we would encourage anyone to come along for a relaxing morning in friendly company and enjoy a cuppa too.
