# RECTOR WRITES



Dear Friends,

For those of you who read the Friday emails or pay attention to the service sheets on a Sunday morning, you'll know by now that I'm more than capable of making a mistake or two. There can be typos or there can be dates or times that are completely wrong. Often this can be down to the technology, the often dangerous habitat of cutting and pasting and often it's simply down to me thinking I've typed the right thing without having paid enough attention to realise. In a previous church I had a good friend who was brilliant at spotting these not so deliberate mistakes. I did laugh a little after I'd left the parish and this person took over the social media. Their very first post got the service time wrong. I was much too polite to point the error out.

The old saying "we can't see the wood from the trees" so often rings true, as if you're like me quite often we only see what we want to see. It can be small things like a date or time on an announcement or it can run much deeper, for example, when we only see the good (or bad) in ourselves or others. Studies have shown that we often fail to perceive things that are "right before our eyes," a sort of misinformation by omission. The phenomenon is known as inattentual blindness and means we can miss the most obvious of things, the lost keys that are right in front of us, something missing in a room or reading a date or time as we expect it to be, not what it actually says.

As I read through the Bible, I see so many instances where people don't see what is right in front of them. Take the story of the choosing of David as God's King in waiting. Samuel, the prophet, and David's father, Jesse, are quick to assume who God will chose by looking at the outward appearance of each son. God of course has other plans, he can see the type of character that is really needed rather than just the obvious, so each brother is turned down until David is chosen. The right person was there all along but no one could see it as they thought they couldn't see what was right before their eyes.

As we move into the New Testament and read through the Gospels, we time and time again see Jesus reveal to us glimpses of the Kingdom of Heaven by how he cares for those on the margin of society, how he has compassion for the lost

and has time for those who are suffering. However, the religious leaders of the time think they know better, they only see what they want

to see and so they dismiss the teaching and example of Jesus because it doesn't fit with the image of God they had created for themselves. They were being told to care for the poor and those in any sort of need, they were being taught to love all, even their enemy, but they suffered from inattentual blindness, they couldn't see the obvious. When Jesus told them that the Kingdom of God was being revealed by his very presence they just couldn't see what was there in front of their very eyes. Emmanuel, God was with them, but they had their own image of God and Jesus didn't fit their narrative.

I think this failure to see what God was making so clear through sending his Son into the world has continued throughout the history of the church. So often we have taken Christianity and made it about what we want it to be, a reason to do harm, a reason to exclude others, a reason to claim supremacy and our eyes (or minds) haven't been able to see what God wanted us too.

We may not use our Christianity to abuse power but quite often we too can fall into the trap of wanting a God to fit our vision, not God's. We may want a God who responds to all our needs, so when things go wrong we fail to see what God taught us about suffering or carrying our burdens. Or we may want a God who thinks the same as us, only loves people who are like us, only wants us to worship the way we like. All of these things, and more, can prevent us from seeing God as revealed through Jesus. How sad it would be if we only saw God through the demands of our own eyes rather than the God who sent his Son into the world through love to teach us to love one another, care for the poor and oppressed and be people who seek justice for all.

I pray that all of our eyes will be truly opened to see Jesus, not the version we want, but the Saviour who gave his life so that we could have life in eternity.

# A TRIBUTE TO CANON CECIL BRYAN



It was with great sadness that we learned of the death of our highly respected former Rector Canon Cecil William Bryan. Canon Cecil died peacefully at his home in Newbridge on 6<sup>th</sup> January 2026 following a long battle with illness. Cecil, beloved husband of Primrose for 58 years and loving and loved father of David, Caroline and Jill.

Cecil was ordained as a deacon in 1968 being appointed to serve as a Curate Assistant in Zion Parish, Dublin. In 1972 he was appointed as a Chaplain to the RAF before moving to become our Rector here in Castleknock and Mulhuddart with Clonsilla in 1975.

Cecil and Primrose arrived to our parishes with two young children, David, who was four at the time, and Caroline, who was two. It wasn't the easiest of arrivals as during the vacancy in 1974/1975, following the departure of Canon Neill and the arrival of then Rev Bryan, the Select Vestry decided to sell the rectory situated on the Castleknock Road. It was felt that the house was in poor repair and that there was no great merit in retaining it as a rectory. An exchange of houses and cash was arranged. The owners of 12 Hawthorn Lawn (a recent housing development at the time) at the western end of Castleknock village, moved to the rectory

and the Bryan's moved into the much smaller Hawthorn Lawn house which remained the Rectory until 2022. In 1979 Cecil and Primrose's third child, Jill, was born completing their family.

Cecil spent fourteen years as Rector of Castleknock and Mulhuddart with Clonsilla. He is fondly remembered by parishioners who were in the parish at that time and many have kept in touch with the Bryan family over the years. Many have commented that Cecil was an encourager by nature and actively supported parishioners who were interested in beginning new initiatives. He had a heart for children's and youth ministry and we are blessed that he helped establish a number of groups that are still going strong today by giving his support to members of the church who suggested these new ministries. In 1978 Tiny Tots and Sunday morning creche began under the guidance of Anne Cadoo. In 1987 Canon Cecil asked Hilary Nason to start a Girls' Brigade Company and the following year, in 1988, David Smyth set up a Boys' Brigade Company. Tiny Tots, and the uniformed organisations are still at the heart of our churches today, a testament to Cecil's vision.

Canon Bryan was also very faithful to older, housebound parishioners and was highly regarded for his pastoral care of all. His commitment was so that he continued to visit one of the elderly ladies after he had moved to Kings' Hospital as he knew her health was failing and she appreciated his ministry to her. He took her funeral in St Brigid's Church some months' later.



Cecil was a keen sportsman and refereed schools' rugby matches for Castleknock College. When in Castleknock Parish he played cricket with Phoenix Taverners in the Phoenix Park. He also ran a marathon before it became such a popular activity. He and the late Serby Cashell initiated the St Stephen's Day hockey matches, which continued for many years and are fondly remembered by a number of generations of parishioners.



# A TRIBUTE TO CANON CECIL BRYAN

It was with great sadness that Cecil announced his departure from the parish in 1989 when he returned to chaplaincy, this time in Kings Hospital where he continued to minister to a number of the younger parishioners. Following ten years as Chaplain of KH, Cecil was appointed as Rector of Tullow in 1999 where he remained until his retirement in 2007. In 2002, during his time in Tullow, he was appointed a Canon to Christ Church Cathedral, Dublin.

Sadly Cecil developed Parkinson's disease when he was still working in ministry and relatively young. He struggled with this disease for the rest of his life but still took opportunities, along with Primrose, to keep in contact with a number of parishioners from his time here in the parish. We remain thankful for Cecil's legacy as Rector of our parishes and we continue to keep Primrose, David, Caroline and Jill in our prayers.

# UPCOMING EVENTS

## Confirmation 2026

Confirmation classes began in January ahead of the Archbishop coming to confirm our young people at a special service on Saturday 11<sup>th</sup> April at 4pm in St Brigid's, Castleknock. There are 14 young people considering Confirmation and classes will continue on the 8<sup>th</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> February at 4pm in Castleknock Parish Centre. Through the classes the young people will look at the Christian faith as laid out in the Apostles Creed and will be encouraged to examine what that faith means to them.

## Ash Wednesday and Lent

There will be two services to mark Ash Wednesday on 18<sup>th</sup> February. We will have our regular Holy Communion Service at 10.30am in Castleknock Parish Centre. In the evening there will be a reflective Eucharist in St Mary's, Clonsilla at 7.30pm as we begin the journey through Lent.

Our Lent "Soup and Services" will take place during Lent in St Mary's, Clonsilla. These will begin on Tuesday 3<sup>rd</sup> March at 12.30pm and continue each Tuesday until Holy Week (excluding St Patrick's Day). We are seeking volunteers to make soup and bring bread, please speak to Rev Colin.

Our Lent Home Group Bible Study will take place in the Rectory (D15 PN2F) on Thursday evenings on 26<sup>th</sup> February, 5<sup>th</sup>, 19<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> March at 7.30pm. Our theme this year will be "Follow Me." We will be looking at what it means to follow Jesus through Lent and in our lives. Taking Jesus' journey to the cross, as well as other Scripture references, the Study will help us to grow in faith together. The Bible Studies are friendly and designed for everyone, all are welcome to join us.

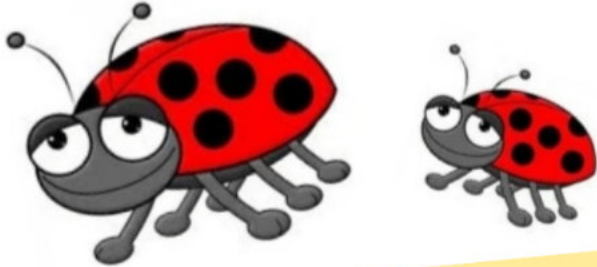

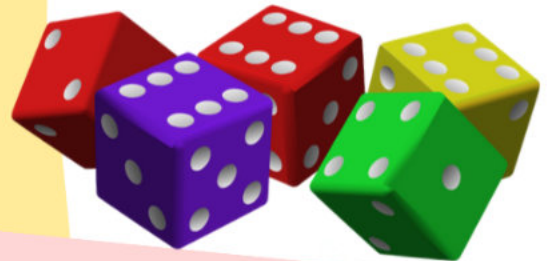
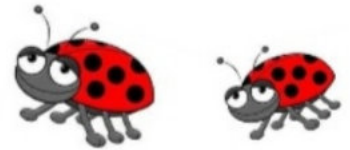

Youth Group met on Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> December for their Christmas evening with some unusual Christmas themed party games putting us in the Festive mood.

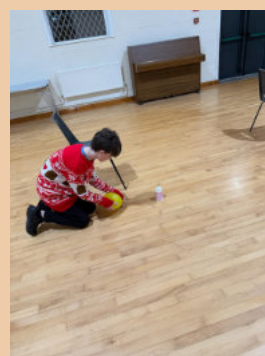
Great to see our young people getting together and enjoying fun and friendship, the chocolates helped too!

## Parish Centre Works Update

Over the past year there have been a number of major projects carried out by the Parish Centre Management Committee as they strive to ensure the Centre is both well maintained and meets the standards needed for usage under current regulations. Those upgrades have included the refurbishment of the old part of the building, office and Maharry room with a new heating system. New boilers have been fitted for the main body of the building including the two larger halls. The toilets have been completely updated, outside of the building painted and two new doors (fire door in Main hall and front door) fitted.



As many of you will know the Main Hall was out of action for the first few weeks of January for a major refurb. Due to the presence of damp and mould and a lack of proper insulation both the acoustic tiles and ceiling tiles had to be replaced and properly insulated. The Hall was also lacking in ventilation, so a new air pumping system has been fitted to ensure the hall stays damp and mould free. The Hall has new lights and has been painted giving it a fresh new look and the sound quality has improved greatly.

As we prepare for the 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary in December this year of the hall being redeveloped, there are still a few big projects to come with the biggest being a kitchen refurb.

Of course, all of this work comes at a cost, and we are thankful that the Parish Centre brings in a profit each year which has helped meet some of the costs. However, there is not a bottomless pot, so in March we will be holding an appeal for anyone who would like to support the redevelopment work.
