

# RECTOR WRITES



Dear Friends,

I'm sure many of you have been watching the Winter Olympics over the last couple of weeks and been amazed at the skills and bravery of those who take part. Quite often we've witnessed athletes throwing themselves into the air on skis or snowboards or throwing themselves off massive ski jumps.

Before the competitions began I was unaware of the American Ice Skater Llia Malinin, who I discovered to be quite the internet sensation on Tik Tok and elsewhere. Llia entered the Winter Olympics as a massive favourite in men's figure skating having been unbeaten in competition for almost three years. He certainly didn't seem to be lacking in confidence. He gave himself the nickname "quad god" thanks to his excellence in the quad axel (spinning around four times in the air). For his routines Llia dances to a soundtrack bearing his own voice over music. Coming into the competition as two time World champion and four time US National champion and the only skater ever to complete that quadruple loop in a competition, his confidence seemed well placed.

Llia was well ahead following the first skate and even his competitors seemed to be happy skating for the silver. However, from the moment he took to the ice in the free skate, Llia looked nervous, the quad loop was just over a double and the routine lacked all the promised drama. As the routine continued, Llia eventually ended up on the ice after not one but two falls. As the judges began to give their scores there were gasps from the stands and a look of shock on the other competitors. Llia was placed 15<sup>th</sup> for his free skate leaving him 8<sup>th</sup> overall. A shocked Mikhail Shaidorov from Kazakhstan realised he had won the gold medal, Llia was distraught, disbelief of how he had failed on the biggest stage when it seemed the gold medal was already around his neck.

As I watched on the TV I couldn't help but think of that old phrase "talking a good game." It didn't matter about the self-belief, the hype or even the nickname, the only thing that mattered was how each skater performed on

the ice rink and unfortunately for Llia, he didn't perform when it really mattered.

As we journey through this season of Lent. I always think it's good for us to remember the danger of "talking a good game". We can focus on giving up chocolate (or cheese), telling everyone of our sacrifice, we undertake a Lenten journey publicly but we aren't undertaking a spiritual journey that's bringing us closer to God.

Throughout Scripture we see the conflict between those who consider themselves to be religious and what God actually wants of us. The writer of Psalm 51 tells us -

**"For you desire no sacrifice, else I would give it; you take no delight in burnt offerings.**

**The sacrifice of God is a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart, O God, you will not despise."**

In the Gospels we see Jesus time and time again clashing with the Sadducees and Pharisees who are more focused on their interpretation of God's law and the outward appearance than living lives that reflect God's love. In other words the religious leaders talked a good game rather than living it out.

If we are honest with ourselves, we probably all recognise that we can fall in to the same trap. It is my prayer this Lent that we will use the journey to examine our own lives, our faith and our commitment. Are we living lives that speak of God's love and mercy, are we serving God and serving our neighbours? Are we seeking to grow in faith during this time of reflection or will it simply pass us by? I ask you to please use this a time to grow in faith, to pray for me as your Rector, for our churches that we grow together in faith, love and even number in the coming years.

# REMEMBERING BERYL STONE AND PARISH CENTRE FUNDRAISING

Many of you would remember Beryl Stone who died in May 2023. Beryl was an active member of Castleknock Parish, along with other churches, throughout her life. Beryl was well known for her skill as a photographer taking many photographs for parish publications and keeping photographic records of a lot of the developments in the parish over the years. Beryl was also known for her passion for missionary projects and her commitment to the ministry to children and young people. Many will remember being part of Beryl's Sunday Club class or her contribution to Youth Group. Beryl also produced many wonderful resources to teach children Bible stories that were way ahead of their time.



In Beryl's will it was her wish that our church in Castleknock should be amongst the recipients. In late 2025 we received a very generous donation from Beryl's estate. In conjunction with Beryl's wishes and through conversation with her executor, Rev Colin and the Select Vestry felt the majority of the donation should go towards improving the Parish Centre, a place Beryl often used for her ministry to children and young people and in keeping with her vision for outreach and mission in our community.

In the summer of this year, we plan to refit the kitchen area, which is in much need of upgrading. We believe this will be a fitting memory to Beryl and her contribution to our churches during her lifetime.

## **We need your support**

While Beryl's donation is a wonderful Godly gesture and we are so thankful for the impact, as pointed out in last month's magazine, the Parish Centre has undergone major refurbishment in the past two years. With the work on the kitchen and also major work needed to replace the lead on the roof, we will have spent close to €300,000 on the building to ensure it continues to be an asset for not only parish activities but also for the whole community.

I know for the vast majority of so many of our parishioners, the Parish Centre has played a major role in your lives and of your families. Some of you were involved in the project some thirty years ago to extend the original building to the wonderful Centre we have today and we want to continue to honour your legacy and vision. Others of you will either yourselves or your children attended our parish organisations over the years. Maybe you grew up in BB, GB or Guides, went to Pathfinders, Youth Group or Sunday Club in the Centre. Others of you will have played bowls or table tennis, made crafts, served teas and coffees, enjoyed Parish Fairs. Maybe you even did Ballet, sang in a community choir or have children in School Kids Aloud, the list is endless!

We are asking if you are in a position to do so and you would like help to ensure the Parish Centre continues to be a place for our church and community, that you might consider making a one-off donation during this time of Lent.


# ORGANISATIONS NEWS
