# RECTOR WRITES



Dear Friends,

For Holy Week and Easter this year I have chosen the theme “One Step at a Time” as our focus as we follow in the footsteps of Jesus from the triumphant entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday to the agonising walk with the cross to Calvary to walking out of the tomb. I would encourage as many of you as possible to journey with us on this most Holy of Weeks, a week which enriches our faith and reminds us of the price paid for us by a God who loved the world so much that he sent his one and only Son to die on the cross so we could have eternal life.

In recent weeks our world has been plunged into the depths of yet another conflict in very lands where Jesus walked and people in the Middle East, along with other parts of the world, living in the very real fear of bombs and violence. While we may not be in fear of bombings, many of you will be concerned about relatives living overseas, travel and the escalating prices of fuel, among other everyday goods. In such times as these, as we listen to the news and are uncertain of what each day will bring, we seem to be negotiating life “one step at a time.”

Often in church we seem to be treading “one step at a time” with uncertainty and fears of what the future will hold. For many who have been parishioners for many years, there are real concerns about where the next generation will come from to keep the church going into the future. For those who sit on select vestries or lead our organisations, there is always the question of where new faces will come from and how we can get others involved.

The idea of taking “one step at a time” is never a bad one, Jesus himself once told his us “do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own.” It is often prudent and wise to be cautious and to ensure that we do take each day as it comes. However, my mind wanders to that first Easter morning when the footsteps of Jesus' followers, who had no doubt walked slowly with heavy steps on the day of the crucifixion, turn to running and urgency on finding the empty tomb. Mary could not wait to share the news that Jesus was alive, there was an urgency and purpose to her step as she hurried from the empty tomb.

Often we can get caught up in viewing the church as

being in survival mode, carefully navigating “one step at a time”, trying to maintain buildings or simply keep the doors open. When we move from mission to maintenance, we can so easily forget that wonderful truth of the Easter message “Jesus has Risen.” Our Lord and Saviour overcame death and the grave and we have a wonderful message of Good News to share with the world just as those disciples did on that first Easter morn.

As we travel “one step at a time”, we should do so buoyed by that wonderful message we are sent to proclaim. We should rejoice at all the good things that God has done and continues to do in our churches. We should trust that God will look after tomorrow, that God’s church will always triumph and that there is much for us to be glad about here in Castleknock, Mulhuddart and Clonsilla.

We should also remember that all of us have a part to play in this mission, all of us are called to share that good news and all of us are called to see God’s church flourish and grow in this place, not simply to be maintained.

Let us walk together through this Holy Week and Easter season carrying with us, not just the cross, but by the truth of the glorious Easter morn. I encourage all of you to come and worship with us over this time and I urge each one of us to look at how we can contribute. Our Easter General Vestries are in April, I make no apology for saying you should be there interested in finding out about the running of our churches and asking yourself is there a part to play.

Together we must seek to walk together, a step at a time, a prayer at a time, encouragement at a time to ensure that the glorious news of Easter is shared with our community and beyond.

I wish you all God’s richest blessing for Easter and if you are able to have a break, I trust you are able to relax and re-energise.

## Holy Week and Easter Sunday

Please join us if you can as we journey through Holy Week towards the agony of Good Friday and the cost of the cross to the jubilant celebration of Easter Sunday.

Our theme this year is “One Step at a Time” and you can see from the leaflet on the next page the services times for the week.

Maundy Thursday will be particularly special as we combine our service with activities for the children all in Castleknock Parish Centre. Starting at the earlier time of 6.30pm the adults will worship in the main hall as we reflect upon the washing of the feet at the Last Supper while the children enjoy some arts and crafts in the smaller hall. We will then come together for a meal before sharing in the Lord’s Supper together. If anyone would like to help with the crafts or to prepare a “one pot” dish for sharing, please speak to Rev Colin or Olive.

On Good Friday we look forward to joining with our friends from the Roman Catholic community for our annual Ecumenical Walk with the Cross from Laurel Lodge to Beech Park then finishing in St Brigid’s. We also meet on Good Friday evening in Clonsilla.

On Easter Sunday we have three special services starting with the Dawn Service in St Thomas’, Mulhuddart. Then a Family Worship with Holy Communion in both Clonsilla and Castleknock. There will also be an “Egg Hunt” after each service (mostly for the children!).



## Confirmation 2026

Confirmation classes finished in March ahead of the Archbishop coming to confirm our young people at a special service on Saturday 11th April at 4pm in St Brigid’s, Castleknock.

Our final class saw us look at the sacraments of Baptism and Holy Communion before our rehearsal ahead of the service.

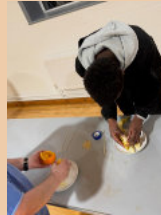
# ORGANISATIONS NEWS

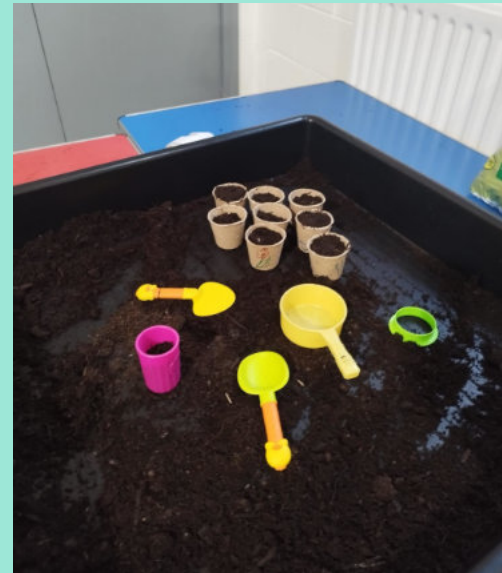
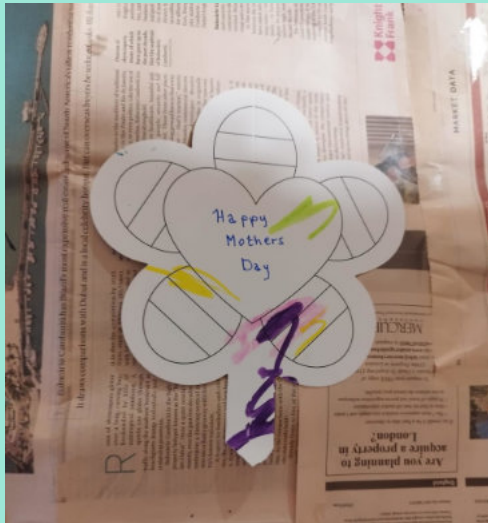

# EASTER GENERAL VESTRIES 2026

Every year around Easter, I, along with colleagues up and down the country, try our best to encourage people to attend our churches Easter General Vestries, yet often these appeals fall on deaf ears and in many churches the same few people appear year on year.

## **THIS CANNOT BE THE CASE IN OUR CHURCHES, YOUR CHURCH NEEDS YOU!**

Easter General Vestries take place in Church of Ireland Parishes throughout Ireland over a 4/5 week period either side of Easter. This year our Easter General Vestries will be held on Tuesday 14th April 8pm for Castleknock and Mulhuddart in Castleknock Parish Centre and Thursday 18th April 7.30pm for Clonsilla in St Mary's.

The Easter General Vestry is the Annual General meeting for the church in which you learn what has happened over the past year, the church finances and the Rector's plans for the year ahead. The Select Vestry is also elected for the coming year with all those on the Easter General Vestry Register eligible to vote and be elected. Of course coming to the Easter General Vestry does not mean you'll be voted on, it is okay to come along, in fact it is good practice for all parishioners to do so and is strongly encouraged. This is a triennial year so there are other important roles to be elected including Parochial Nominators (the people who chose a new rector when needed) and Diocesan Synod Reps.

We are blessed in our churches to have a group of dedicated people who give up of their time and gifts to serve our churches. But, like every church there is a danger of us relying upon and over burdening the same people over and over again. The best way for a church to thrive is for as many people to play their part and to share the workload.

This year in particular we are looking for people with skill and experience in finance as both of our treasurers, Alex and Gordon, feel it is time to hand over the role to new faces.

The Select Vestries also need new people to ensure we have fresh eyes and also new thoughts as we seek to continue to grow our churches and ensure they are maintained to the best standards. Perhaps you have skills in property management, building knowledge, administration or grant applications. Maybe you've a background in health and safety or risk assessments. These and so many other gifts and skills can be put to good use on our Vestries.

As churches we cannot operate without the willingness of people to volunteer and use their gifts for God's glory. Please carefully consider and pray about how you might be able to get involved and even if it is just to hear about the running of our churches please put the date of the Easter General Vestry for your church into your diary and make a commitment to coming along.

As Rector I am so thankful for those who give up of their time and talents to serve our church community through Select Vestry and in so many other ways. These people enable us more than I do to be church and to have church in our communities. They simply need more people to share the load and to get involved.

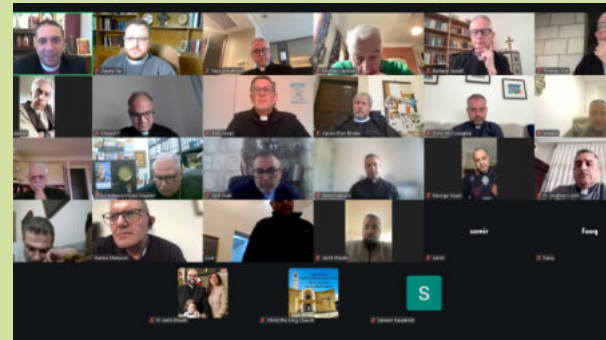
## Diocese of Jerusalem Link

As many of you will know I was meant to travel to Jerusalem in March along with the Archbishop and a few other members of clergy from our Dioceses to link up with our partner Diocese of Jerusalem and the Middle East. Due to the latest conflict in the region travel was not possible at this time but we were able to meet together on Wednesday 18th March for a short time online.

The time together as always was based on Scripture as we shared from Romans 8: 35-29. Archbishop Hosam reminded us that when Paul wrote his letter in the midst of the threat of persecution and even death, he didn't try to give answers for the hardship the people faced but rather reminded them that even through the bleakest of circumstances nothing can separate us from the love of Christ. Following reflections from both Archbishop Hosam and Archbishop Michael, the clergy shared together their own reflections on the conflict and how this affected our congregations both in the Middle East and here in Ireland.

It was a wonderful time together of solidarity and friendship as we shared together and learnt from one another. We continue to keep our friends and all who live under the threat of violence, war and genocide in our prayers and we continue to speak up for the innocent people who are caught up in conflicts across the world.

## Parish Centre Fundraising
